The anthropology department at UC Irvine specializes in sociocultural anthropology, a subfield devoted to the in-depth study of culture. Faculty also have research expertise in linguistic anthropology, the study of relationships between language, culture and society.

³Considering that students need approximately 60 elective units beyond general education, school and major requirements, they should start thinking early about how to satisfy these, especially when potential minors or double majors have prerequisites.

⁴Students are also strongly encouraged to take both Anthro 30A and 30B.

⁵Students are strongly encouraged to take Anthro 180A after they have had at least three courses beyond Anthro 2A and 2B, 2C, or 2D.
